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Heritage Crafts and City & Guilds Foundation award two new bursaries for Black and ethnically diverse trainees

Heritage Crafts and the City & Guilds Foundation are delighted to award two new bursaries for Black and ethnically diverse trainees in heritage crafts.

These bursaries follow three previously provided through the partnership, intended to support trainees from diverse backgrounds experiencing financial hardship, as the UK continues to deal with the ongoing cost-of-living crisis.

Hannah Girvan is a Devon-based early-career furniture maker and architectural joiner who works for Woodlab, making furniture from local wood that they kiln-dry on site. Their bursary will allow them to undertake a oneto-one apprenticeship there, alongside spending up to a week per month at fine furniture school Williams & Cleal. Their goal is to develop a skillset based on eco-forestry principles. They plan to teach and speak in support of an inclusive culture in heritage crafts, helping craftspeople of the future.

Leena Patel is an Edinburgh-based earlycareer jewellery maker. For the last two years she has attended weekly communitybased jewellery-making sessions. Her bursary will allow her to complete a oneyear foundation course to continue on her jewellery-making journey. The course would provide an in-depth knowledge into the skills required to become a jewellery maker and designer. Ultimately, she hopes to start a business, and to encourage a diverse range of people with different backgrounds and

It is still the case that the UK craft sector does not accurately reflect the diversity of the UK as a whole and, for this reason, we are taking positive action to target this bursary at Black and ethnically diverse groups who are currently under-represented.

Heritage Crafts and the City & Guilds Foundation believe that the value of our craft heritage comes from the diversity of skills and traditions across all of our communities, whatever their background. Hannah and Leena's bursaries follow three others supported through the partnership: stone carver **Marcia Bennett Male**, split wood basketmaker **Michelle Mateo**, and carpenter and joiner **Nkosi Kerr**.

The City & Guilds Foundation is part of the City & Guilds charity, and its programmes are targeted to help everyone, no matter who they are or where they come from, have opportunities to succeed.

City & Guilds Foundation Advocacy Lead Lauren Roberts said:

"Quality skills development for all is at the heart of what we do at the City & Guilds Foundation.
